Alachua Conservation Trust is a nonprofit land trust whose mission is to protect the natural, historic, scenic, and recreational resources in and around North Central Florida. ACT protects land through purchase, donation, and conservation easements in 16 counties. ACT has facilitated the protection of over 58,000 acres of vital habitat, which includes the management of 12 preserves open to the public for passive recreation. ACT is invested in the community as well as the natural ecosystems and hosts events and volunteer workdays nearly year round that encourage folks to get out in nature and learn about land conservation.



Professor Spotlight

Robert Wagman is a classicist specializing in the epigraphy and archaeology of ancient Greece. He is from Italy and has been at UF since 1990, where he teaches various courses in classics, including Classical Antiquity and Sustainability- an option to fulfill the humanities requirement for sustainability studies majors.

How did you get into the realm of sustainability and classics?

As a field archaeologist it is normal for me to engage with the physical environment of the sites I research. The Greek land has a lot of stories to tell if you learn how to read it. The evidence it provides is as important for understanding antiquity as are the works of Homer and Plato.

What is your favorite part about teaching, and your favorite class to teach?

The first question is easy. My favorite thing about teaching is that every semester I get to know and (usually) befriend lots of new people. There are not many professions that allow you to do that. As for the second question, I don't know- I like all the subjects I teach, whether it is Greek, the ancient environment, or Egyptian hieroglyphs. It is the rapport with the students that makes the difference. Regardless of the subject, each new class has its own vibe.

Do you have any advice for current UF Sustainability Students?

My advice for Sustainability students is the same that I would give to all my other students. Don't be blinded by all the corporate advertising that has taken over UF and other schools. Forget about being top 5 or 4, and work on learning and thinking. We have a long way to go.

Professor Robert Wagman (cont.)

How can students apply sustainability and classics to this modern age?

Being able to think critically about the past enables us to make informed choices about the present and the future. This is not some corny piece of wisdom downloaded from the internet, but a basic fact of the cognition process which uses information from past experience to adjust behavior. To trace the origins of many of our behaviors today, including how we use the Earth's resources,, we often need to go back millenia.

You are currently in Greece, what are you doing there and how do you think learning new cultures can benefit students wanting to do the same in a program abroad?

I always encourage students to travel, because there is only so much you can learn in the classroom. Learning is subversive by definition. There is no better way to break off from habit and conformity than by traveling to other countries and experiencing places and cultures different from your own. I go to Greece for my fieldwork. For students, to volunteer at an archaeological site is a great study abroad option. It is like one of those 2 for 1 promotions you not only get to travel across space; you also get to travel across time.

What made you choose to study sustainability at UF?

I had always been passionate about the environment and sustainability, and I wanted to learn how to do that in the most effective way possible, to try and translate it to other people.

How did your internships at Alachua Conservation Trust and EARTHDAY.ORG impact your experiences and knowledge of working in sustainability?

They were valuable experiences, for sure, and I was very lucky to have been given those opportunities. I had never done any hands-on work or outreach before. Starting school with COVID was really hard, so I didn't have any opportunities until in my last year, I felt it was really important for me to learn about community engagement, event planning, and social media outreach, especially after the pandemic. I've been able to carry those skills into my graduate school career. I did social media for both internships, and for ACT I was actually able to go to the community events, which were a lot of fun. It felt so good to actually be able to do things in person. The EARTHDAY.ORG internship was remote, and a new branch of the department which was exciting since there was a lot of development happening.

What type of work do you do in graduate school and what does your day-to-day look like?

I have a lot of different things going on right now, but no project that I'm working on yet- but, I have been given so many opportunities. I have a class schedule, but everyday is different. I did a week of hands on shark research, which was so much fun and a great opportunity. I've also been collecting baseline data for one of the parks in the Florida Keys, and have even done some terrestrial things as well. We learned how to safely capture and handle invasive snakes. I like how many opportunities I've been given, and I am able to do so much now. It is challenging, but very rewarding.

What is your end goal with attending graduate school for a masters in marine conservation?

Even in undergrad, people would ask me what my end goal or ideal career was, and it's such a scary question. I don't have a specific job title or career or even area of study I want to work in. My main goal is to communicate science to the general public. If we're being realistic, people don't sit around in their day-to-day reading published scientific papers, but I think it's important people so know what is happening in the world. I want to turn this information into something that is more digestible across platforms that are accessible to everyone.

Do you have any advice for soon to be sustainability graduates who are looking to go to grad school in the future?

Take every opportunity you are given, even if it's not honestly what you want to do, run with it. It's going to create opportunities for you to network, meet new people, and get directed towards other people. All experiences are going to help you grow. We need to remember we're doing this for something bigger than ourselves, so remember where you started and it'll help you get through it.
